## Legendary 'Coach C' dies

### Under Cvijanovich, Santa Clara soared

He was so accomplished, so influential, so legendary, that he's famously known as "Coach C."

Lou Cvijanovich, who coached CIF-Southern Section championships in three different sports but is best known for turning the Santa Clara High boys basketball team into a perennial powerhouse, died at age 92 at his Oxnard home Saturday.

Pat Frank, who played for Cvijanovich from 1974-76 and is now the head boys basketball coach at St. Bonaventure High, said he received a text message from son Scott Cvijanovich confirming Lou's passing.

Frank and Mater Dei boys basketball coach Gary McKnight visited with Cvijanovich and his wife Martha on Friday at their home.

"We got our chance to pay our respects," said Frank. "The family had brought him home in the past week. It was always so good to see him."

The exemplary coach and teacher had been battling cancer for over a decade, Frank said. In recent years, he had also developed a heart condition.

Frank has warm memories of his

coach and mentor. "I've always been so close to him and

his family, and that's the way he was," said Frank.

"If you played for him, you were part of his family. That's a big part of what made him so special."

Cvijanovich piled up coaching accomplishments that mark him as a singular legend.

He took the reigns of the Santa Clara boys basketball team in 1958 and spent the next 41 seasons, or until 1999, racking up a state-record 829 victories, 30 league championships, 15 Southern Section titles and three state crowns.

#### Newbury Park, Young power to Div. 2 state championships

To claim the program's first state cross country title, Newbury Park High needed a near record-setting perfor-

Fast at the top of its lineup and at the bottom, Newbury Park won the Division II boys team title Saturday at the CIF State Cross Country Championships at Woodward Park in Fresno.

Foothill Tech's bid to become the

county's second girls team to win threestraight state titles ended with a runner-up finish to Sage Creek, 110-119, in the Division IV final.

Junior Nico Young of Newbury Park won the individual title in 14 minutes, 59.2 seconds, joining Jeff Wilson (1990 and 1991) as the program's only state winners. Young became the county's fifth individual state champion. Previous champions from Ventura County were Santa Clara's Aaron Sharp (1997), Rio Mesa's Phillip Reid (2002), Royal's Michael Cybulski (2006) and Wilson.

Oak Park's Sarah Shulze was second

in the Division III girls final in 17:34.8. Newbury Park posted the secondfastest team time in Division II state meet history with a 77:51 as it edged runner-up La Costa Canyon, 77-90 in team points. Only Ventura's 2014 state championship team has run faster (77:43).

La Costa Canyon had a team time of 77:55, the division's third-fastest time

## Costello, Stanford defeat **UCLA**

Bruins finish with three wins in Kelly's first year

PASADENA - Stanford coach David Shaw is the first to admit that he hasn't been comfortable with his team all season. But as long as they keep winning, it doesn't matter to him.

The Cardinal once again got big plays from their passing game as they rallied for a 49-42 victory over UCLA on Saturday.

Stanford had nine pass plays of 15 or more yards with four resulting in touchdowns. K.J. Costello completed 23 of 37 for 344 yards and a career high five touchdowns as they extended their winning streak over the Bruins to 11 games.

"I've learned a lot this year. Apparently my comfort level doesn't matter," Shaw said.

"We've been an enigma but the one thing that has been consistent are the big plays in our passing game. Hopefully they continue to happen and we'll grow in the running game."

The Cardinal (7-4, 5-3 Pac-12) trailed 42-41 midway through the fourth quarter when the junior threw a 52-yard touchdown pass to Osiris St. Brown. Bryce Love ran it in for the twopoint conversion to put them up by a touchdown.

The wins total has been surpassed in recent years by Mater Dei's McKnight.

The Saints won state championships in 1989, 1990 and 1999 and remain the only Ventura County boys basketball program to have reached the state championship game. Among the Saints' illustrious alumni

are Shon Tarver and Joe Wallace. There were other sides to his coach-

ing genius.

Cvijanovich was Santa Clara's head football coach for 17 years and the head baseball coach for 11 years, and regularly guided those programs to the top.

Under his direction, the Saints football team won 104 games, seven league championships and two Southern Section crowns. His baseball teams won 114 games, five league championships and one Section title.

With 18 overall CIF-SS championships, he remains the only coach in California prep history to win section crowns in basketball, football and base-

Upon his retirement in 1999, Cvijanovich was elected into the California

High School Sports Hall of Fame. He's also a member of the Ventura County Sports Hall of Fame, the California Coaches Association Hall of Fame and the National High School Hall of Fame. The gymnasium at Santa Clara High

was renamed in his honor in 1996. In 2012, he also had street in Oxnard renamed for him. A portion of Laurel Street became "Coach C Lane." He loved the street ceremony.

"It's flabbergasting," he said at the time. "It's the second-greatest honor I've ever had in my life." And the first? As a devout Catholic,

he said No. 1 was an apostolic blessing he received from Pope John Paul II in At the street-naming celebration, he

commented on his coaching success.

"It took a lot of hard work," he told The Star. "I had a motto: certain sacrifices equal success. That pertains to everyday life, too."

The Cvijanovich children shared their father's love of sports. Sam played football, daughter Sherri was the head girls basketball coach at Santa Clara and son Stacey was good enough to play basketball for the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.
